The bill fixing the interest rate has been ruled out by Judge Kelly so will not be on the ballot.

People signed the petition who did not understand what they were signing. A vote for this income tax measure will be a vote against the grange income tax bill.

PORTLAND TO SHOULDER 1925 FAIR BURDEN

Making of the 1925 exposition an exposition for the entire state and not simply a Portland exposition is the policy that was made definite at a recent meeting of this committee in charge of the campaign to get the voters of Oregon to permit Portland to tax itself for the fair.

While Portland proposes to provide for the financing of the fair through taxing itself alone, no tax being contemplated on the remainder of the state, it is necessary to get authority to do so through a constitutional amendment to be voted upon next November throughout the entire state. Because of the advantages which will accrue to every county in Oregon through the exposition, the committee urges general support of the proposed amendment.

"Oregon's scenic attractions, its industrial, agricultural and commercial possibilities and advantages are too little known in other parts of the United States," says the committee, "and a big, complete exposition presents a method of reaching many thousands of people who will thus be attracted to the state."

"California has impressed the world because of its extensive advertising of its 'goods', and is reaping a great harvest in development and increased population. Oregon must do likewise. Thousands of people should be coming to this state where now there are hundreds, and the 1925 exposition is a move to put Oregon in line with the great development of the Pacific Coast."

If the exposition measure carries the publicity campaign will commence at once throughout the world.
