

Lightning Causes Death of Wife of Pioneer.

An article in the Outlook several issues ago mentioned an aged couple, Mr. and Mrs. B. F. Bonney of Mulino, Oregon, who attended the Adventist camp meetings held in Troutdale the latter part of August. Mr. Bonney is said to be the oldest pioneer in Oregon.

Word was received a short time ago by Mrs. L. P. Manning, second cousin to Mr. Bonney, of the death of Mrs. Bonney at their home in Mulino on September 9.

When the camp meetings were being held in Troutdale it happened to be the time of the thunder storms followed by lightning which caused so much havoc by setting houses on fire in this district. Mrs. Bonney was sitting on the camp ground underneath an electric light when the lightning struck the light and at the same time struck her with enough force to cause pain to shoot through her heart.

The incident happened about August 29 near the close of the meeting. She and her husband returned to their home but Mrs. Bonney failed to recover from the shock which caused her death about three weeks later.
