SPRINGDALE MAN DIES FROM PARALYSIS

August Elling died Saturday, September 30 at his home in Springdale at the age of 74 years. His death was caused by a second stroke of paralysis. The first one occurred eight years ago from which he suffered until the second stroke came early Saturday morning resulting in his death.

Mr. Elling was born on August 5, 1848, in Germany. He was married and lived there the greater part of his life. In 1906 he came to America and settled in Springdale, Oregon. His wife joined him there the following year. Had he lived until next year, he and his wife would have celebrated their golden wedding anniversary.

Those left to mourn his death are his wife, Theresa Elling and son, William of Springdale, a daughter, Mrs. Anna Geisthardt and two sons, Ernest and Arthur who still live in Germany, one brother, Franz and two nieces living in Portland.

The funeral was held Monday at the Douglas cemetery. The Rev. H. R. Gebhardt preached the sermon.

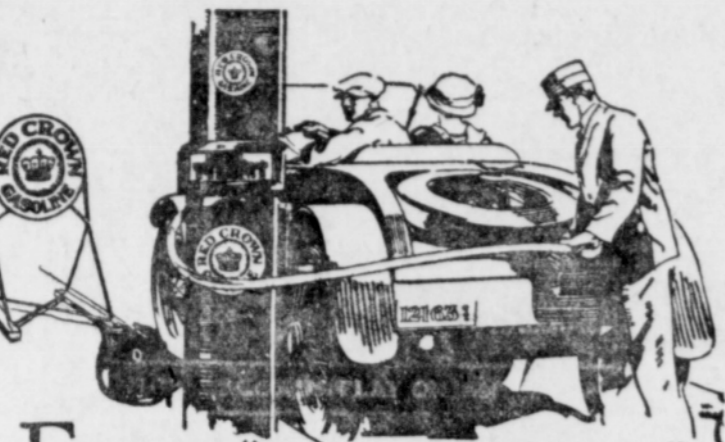
