LETTER CORRECTS RECENT ARTICLE
The Outlook has received a letter from Hamilton Johnstone correcting a statement made in the Outlook a short time ago. The article referred to was a report of the last meeting of the Pomona grange which was held in Gresham. Mr. Johnstone explained the Compulsory Education Bill at that meeting. His letter follows:
"The article is a fair one and I appreciate the consideration given the subject but there is an apparent misapprehension in one particular which I would ask you to correct.
"The article states that I referred to the Failing school as one of the religious institutions maintained by the Catholic church. What I did say in effect was that the Failing public school is a type of the splendid American melting pots exemplified by the Portland public schools; that in that public school there are teachers and pupils of all races, creeds and nationalities but that it has a splendid principal; a first-teacher corps and a well disciplined and loyal class of pupils, and is indeed a school to be proud of. I made no reference to any private or religious institutions by name."
