AGED BORING MAN DEPARTS THIS LIFE

The death of Peter M. Holst, an old resident in this part of Oregon, came as a shock to his many friends and relatives. He died at 3:30 Saturday afternoon, October 7, at his home in Boring. His death is thought to have been caused from heart failure. Mr. Holst was born in Sweden on May 26, 1860. He came to America 44 years ago. Besides the many friends, he leaves a wife and one daughter, Miss Juda Holst. The funeral will be held Wednesday afternoon, October 18, at 1 o'clock at the Deep Creek church near Boring. Interment will be in the Sandy Ridge cemetery.
