ORGANIZED LABOR AND THE FAIR "Organized labor will do everything in its power to get the people of Oregon to indorse the constitutional amendment which will permit Portland to levy a special tax for the 1927 exposition, and organized labor will do all it possible to get the people of Portland to pass the tax measure."

This is the declaration of Otto Hartwig, president of the Oregon State Federation of Labor, and under his direction a large committee has been formed to conduct an active campaign. These activities have been undertaken by organized labor, says Mr. Hartwig, because it feels that general state development and prosperity means continued employment of men in all lines of industry and helps maintain good working conditions, and that the 1927 exposition will be the means of bringing Oregon's resources and advantages and opportunities before the people of the United States in a forcible way.

"Organized labor is more interested in the general upbuilding of this state," says Mr. Hartwig, "than it is in the employment the actual building of the exposition structures would provide."

"The development of irrigation projects in eastern Oregon, hydro-electric power throughout the state; development of farming, increase of our population, with the consequent building that goes with such development and the building of roads and establishment of industries are the things in which we are interested. Oregon is far behind in development of its resources and must make some big move to catch up with progress."

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PIONEER CITIZEN OF DEEP CREEK PASSES

The funeral of P. M. Holst, whose death at his new home in Boring on October 7 was noted in the last Outlook, was held from the Deep Creek Baptist church on Wednesday, October 11. The ministers participating in the service were Rev. T. Gideon Sjolander of Portland, E. Bjorkquist, state missionary, Rev. Andrew Johnson, W. Blomquist and Nels Lindholm of Haley, David Nygren, evangelist of California and G. H. Lilja of Deep Creek. Carl Sjolander composed a poem for the occasion which he read. The pall bearers were the six sons of Mr. Holst's brother, J. M. Anderson. The honorary pall bearers were G. H. Lilja, E. Boling, J. W. Ackerson and A. Gustavson. The singers were Miss Alma Nelson and Miss Helen Tjernlund of Portland and Mrs. H. Hagerberg of Powell Valley, who rendered beautiful selections.

The funeral was largely attended by the neighbors and friends of the deceased and the floral offerings were numerous and beautiful.

Peter M. Holst was born in Skane, Sweden, May 26, 1860. His death came as the result of heart trouble after an illness of three weeks, and was a shock to his wide circle of friends in and near Boring. Mr. Holst came to America in 1879 and to Oregon in 1882, when he took up his farm in the Deep Creek country, being one of the first settlers there. His life has been an active and self-sacrificing one. He was ever forgetful of self in his efforts to do for others. He was a good citizen, neighbor and friend, and was always interested in advancing community affairs.

Mr. Holst married Elizabeth Patterson of St. Paul, Minnesota, July 5, 1885. This union was blessed with three children, two of whom died in early childhood in October, 1893. On May 6, 1897, he married Lena Sparr of Portland, who survives him. Besides his wife, he is survived by one daughter, Miss Judith, two brothers, C. M. Anderson of Portland and J. M. Anderson of Deep Creek, three sisters, Mrs. A. E. Ackerson of Elbow Lake, Minnesota, Mrs. Anna Larson of Sweden and Mrs. J. W. Ackerson of Deep Creek. Numerous other relatives and a host of friends mourn his departure.

VACANCIES IN ARMY TO BE FILLED

Examinations for the commission of second lieutenant will be held at Camp Lewis this month. The details sent from the War Department follow:

The War Department is endeavoring to fill the existing vacancies in the commissioned personnel of the regular army. As soon as practicable after January 1, 1923, it is hoped that appointments can be made. Young men taking advantage of the present opportunity, to take the examination for commission in the army, will be particularly favored by early appointment.

Examinations for the selection of second lieutenants of the regular army will be held at Camp Lewis during the week beginning October 23d. A special board has been appointed to examine candidates, and young men between the ages of 21 and 30 will have the opportunity of filling the vacancies now waiting for qualified applicants.

Application blanks and further information may be secured from the commanding general of the ninth corps area, Presidio of San Francisco, California, or commanding general, Camp Lewis, Washington.
