Concentrated Nitrates May Become Cheaper.
 Guy Robertson, secretary of the County Farm Bureau, explained why the people should do all in their power to aid the passing of the Norris bill or Ladd bill which is now before congress. The bill is concerned with the developing of the muscle shoals in North Carolina for the making of concentrated nitrates.

Henry Ford is offering to head a company and spend a vast sum of money developing this project. He wants the government to give a lease on the plant for 100 years and will bind himself and his heirs for that length of time. At the expiration of the lease the plant will be turned over to the government in as good condition as it was when he took it. He expects to have to re-build three times during the 100 years.

It is said that the output of nitrates from the muscle shoals is estimated at 460,000 tons which is one-half of the output of the world. Only 8 per cent is to be charged which is expected to lower the present price of nitrates considerably.

The use of concentrated nitrates is being used on the farms more and more to aid the growth of crops. If this new project is allowed to be carried out the farmer will derive a direct benefit. He should, therefore, lend all of the support possible. This can be done by writing to the state senators urging them to favor the measure and aid the passage of the bill.

Meeting to Be Held at Cottrell Church
 At the completion of his address, Guy Robertson spoke of the formation of a local farm bureau organization in the Lusted and Cottrell districts. Other districts may also be included. By organizing, the farmers can buy feed in car load lots through the farm bureau and thus save about \$10 on a ton.

Lusted district voted to go into the local organization. A meeting will be held next Thursday evening, October 19, in the Cottrell church. All those who want to join are urged to be present.

At the close of the meeting refreshments of pie and coffee were served. The Parent-Teacher association officers elected for the coming year are Mrs. Halley, president; Mrs. Meyers, vice president; Mrs. Chas. Gossett, and treasurer; Miss Louise Quay, secretary.

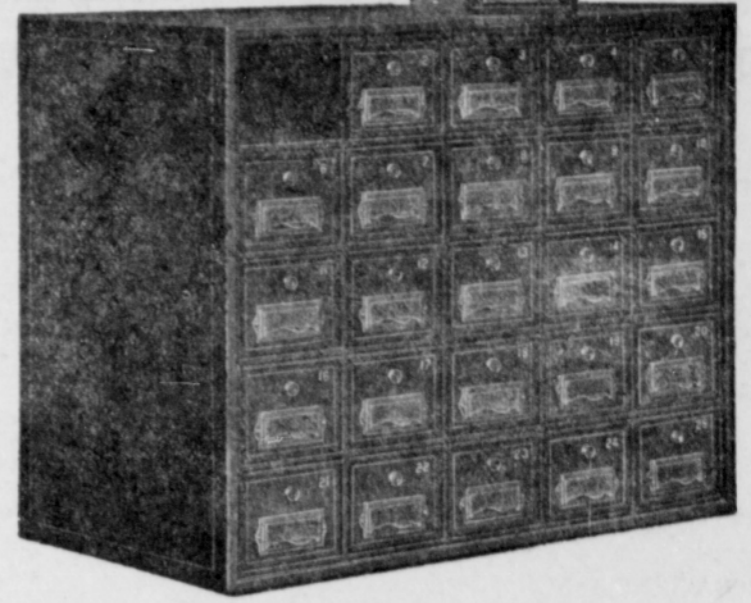
