ROCKWOOD PEOPLE FILE PROTEST

Twenty-five farmers of the Rockwood district appeared before the county commissioners in Portland last Saturday to make protest against the election held on the preceding Saturday, on the proposition to organize the Rockwood water district and authorize issuance of water bonds to 10 per cent of the assessed valuation of the district. This election was carried by a majority of 39 votes.

The farmers protested that unfair methods were used at the election; that electioneering was permitted directly at the polls; that the election board permitted persons to cast their ballots who have lived in the district only three months, and that inmates of the county poor farm were rounded up and carried to the polls to vote for the bond measure.

Last Saturday was the last day in which protest could be filed and the commissioners were obliged to begin the official canvass of votes at that time. They determined that they must proceed, but gave assurance that completion of the canvass will be delayed until 10 o'clock of next Tuesday, and this gives time for the protestants to take legal action. They declared they would file a petition for an injunction to restrain the county commissioners from issuing certificates of election to the water district directors or certifying that the district is duly created by the vote cast.

The Rockwood water district takes in a territory approximately three by seven miles. It extends from the Columbia river to Gresham and from a line two miles east of Portland's eastern boundary line to Troutdale. It is proposed to put in a system to be supplied by Bull Run water from the city trunk line from Bull Run headworks.

A meeting of the residents living within the Rockwood water district has been called for this evening (Friday) and will be held in the Terry schoolhouse. Definite action will be taken against the organizing of the water district. D. E. Towle will preside at the meeting.
