GRESHAM MERCHANT IS SELECTED BY SWINDLERS

A Gresham merchant has recently received a letter from Madrid, which shows that an old Spanish swindle has been revived and its perpetrators are well organized. They are said to be operating in Madrid, Barcelona and other Spanish cities.

The scheme consists in sending letters to certain persons who have previously been selected by confederates. The foundation of the plot is varied somewhat in different cases. In some instances the writer represents himself as a dying prisoner in a military fortress. He has a fortune on deposit in the United States but the certificates of stock are concealed in a secret receptacle of his portmanteau, which has been seized by the Spanish court and will be held until the prisoner, or his representative, has satisfied the cost of the trial.

The letter received in Gresham bears the postmark of Madrid, Spain, and the date of September 11, 1922. It is as follows:

"Being imprisoned here by bankruptcy I beseech you to help me to obtain a sum of 360,000 dollars I have in America being necessary to come here to raise the seizure of my baggage paying to the Registrar of the court the expenses of my trial and recover my portmanteau containing a secret pocket where I have hid two checks payable to bearer for that sum.

As a reward I will give up to you the third part, viz: 120,000 dollars.

I can not receive your answer in the prison but you can send a cablegram to a person of my confidence who will deliver it me, addressed as follows:

Adolfo Adrada, Arriondas Asturias, Spain.

Awaiting your answer to intrust you all my secret, now I sign only you.

First of all answer by cable not by letter.

If an answer is made to the first letter, it is followed by others in which the prisoner claims distant relationship with the addressee and in which the prisoner's daughter plays a prominent part. She is a beautiful girl, left without protection by her father's imprisonment. A proposal is made to send her to the newly found relative in America, if money enough is sent to release the valise containing the secret receptacle and the certificate of deposit. If the relative will accept the trust he is to receive one-fourth or one-third of what remains of the prisoner's fortune, namely \$360,000.00. Of course the "relative" never hears from the swindlers after he has sent the money requested.

Under the Spanish laws a crime must be consummated before the police may act, and the mere attempt to obtain money under false pretenses does not warrant arrest. The money must actually be paid over and the prosecuting witness must be present in person to testify, hence the difficulty in bringing these swindlers to justice.
