

**Tax Reform Demands Public Economics.**  
 With industry bearing the handicap of constantly increasing federal and state taxes, all corners of the country are raising a cry for tax reforms. Generally these demands for a lightening of the burden bear the expression that changing this tax law or repealing that one will remedy the situation. In a minor way, amendments and modifications of the existing statutes would prove beneficial, but the real aid cannot be invited to exert its force until national and state extravagances cease.  
 When economy governs the hands that sign the vouchers in the public's name, then small time will be devoted to consideration of taxation systems, for then they will not be oppressive. Watch the expenditures and the finances will largely take care of themselves.

**A. BRUNNER HAS SLIGHTLY NEW HOME**  
 The fine new ten-room home of A. Brunner on the Section Line road in the western part of the city of Gresham is one of the outstanding attractions of that section. It is built on the high ground above the road and overlooks field and forest to the north extending into the state of Washington. It is a full two-story house with basement and has furnace, bath and lavatory. It is well built and gives one the impression of a substantial country home with city conveniences. It has a Dutch kitchen and built-in buffet. The floors in living room and dining-room are of white oak. Mr. Brunner believes in patronizing home industry and has proven that he can get the best of workmanship right at home. L. J. Winter was the carpenter in charge with H. M. Miller as assistant for a part of the time. Thomas Brothers did the outside painting, the interior finishing and decorating and Wells Chaiker the plumbing. Fred L. Bourne wired the house and Floyd Mack furnished the electric fixtures.  
 The value of the house is placed at between \$5000 and \$6000.  
 Mr. Brunner has built a new garage, which now shelters his new Buick car.

**Wm. McKee.**  
 Wm. McKee is building a new home for his family on the Section Line road a short distance west of the city limits of Gresham. It is of bungalow type built high enough to allow three rooms upstairs. There will be four rooms below. A living room extends across the entire front of the house and is 34 x 15 feet. Special care is being taken to make the house proof against winter winds. Mr. McKee, who is from the city engineer's office in Portland, is putting in his spare time working on the house. The finishing will be done by Mr. Kolstadt.  
**New Store Building.**  
 Wm. J. Merica is building a store, 24 x 44 feet at the northwest corner of Section Line and Barker roads.  
**Small Cottages.**  
 Clarence J. Cleveland has built a 4-room cottage and W. H. Ryder one of two rooms on their two-acre tracts on the Jenne road.  
 The M. M. Squire home west of Gresham on the Powell valley road is one of the recently completed houses. The large dining and livingroom combined is very attractive with its large fireplace, built-in bookcases and homey appearance. The kitchen has all of the built-in features. The upper part of the house is finished off into four sleeping rooms.  
 The A. M. Brannan home east of Gresham on the Andrews road was burned down a few months ago by lightning. It is now being replaced by a better house. C. S. Miller, a Portland contractor has charge of the work. The house is 45 x 35 and one and one-half stories high. When completed, there will be seven rooms, four rooms downstairs and three bedrooms upstairs.

**PLEASANT HOME BUILDING ACTIVITIES**  
 Considerable activity has been shown during the summer in the Pleasant Home district. This includes a new four-room house, poultry buildings and barn for D. T. Williams on the Mt. Hood Loop highway. A water system has been installed.

 Jewell Collins has added a new porch and remodeled the interior of his dwelling.
