Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Simonson have a new home east of Gresham on the Powell Valley road. It is not yet completed. It is a story and a half bungalow 32 feet wide and 34 feet long. All of the work on the interior on the first floor is completed with the exception of the living and dining-rooms. There is a large fireplace in the living room. A built-in buffet will extend across one end of the dining-room. The floors in these two rooms are to be of oak. The kitchen, breakfast nook and bathroom are finished in white enamel while the two bedrooms and a small hall are in the old ivory enamel. There is sufficient room on the upper floor for two rooms but it has not yet been completed. There is a full basement. Heat will be supplied by a pipeless furnace. The house was framed by Oscar Thoren. Mr. Simonson is finishing it during his spare time. The house will be worth \$3500 when complete.

**S. E. Sease Has New Home.**

**SHIPPING SHED IN USE AT TROUTDALE**

A shipping shed was built in Troutdale a few months ago by the O. W. R. & N. company to provide a place for the farmers to pack produce for shipment. It is 50 feet wide and 100 feet long and stands near the depot.

When built the shed was intended to be used solely for the packing of celery and lettuce but potatoes may also be shipped from there this fall. The shed is not frost proof at the present time but it may be made so later on.

The shed is free for the use of the farmers. Eight carloads of lettuce and two cars of celery have already been shipped from there this year and it is expected a much larger quantity will be shipped before the season is over.

U. K. Saiki living on the Powell Valley road is having an addition put on his house.

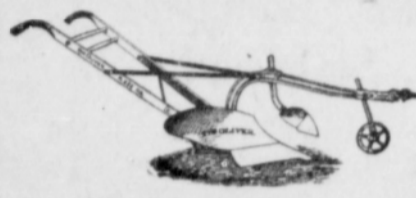
Elliott's store in Powell Valley is getting a new roof and a new coat of paint.

Mr. Frenna is remodeling his home at Gillis station.

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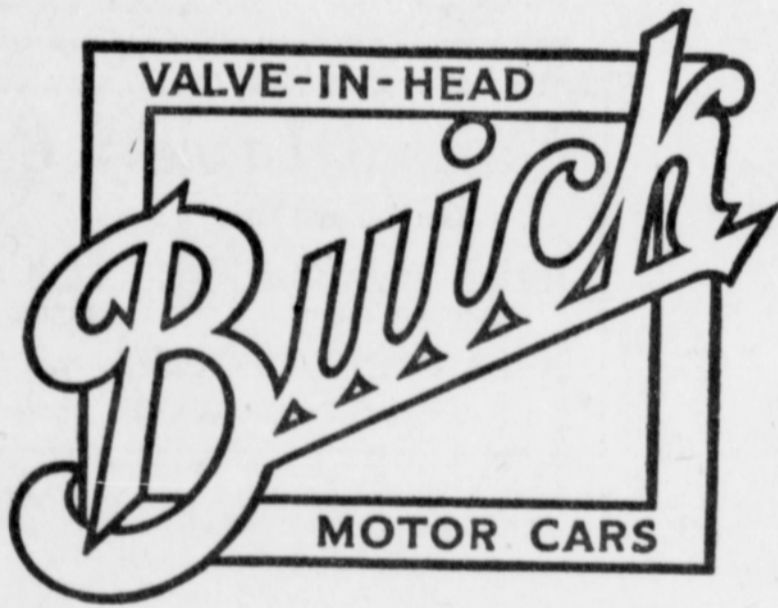
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
