Mrs. J. E. Steifer is reported to be the same.

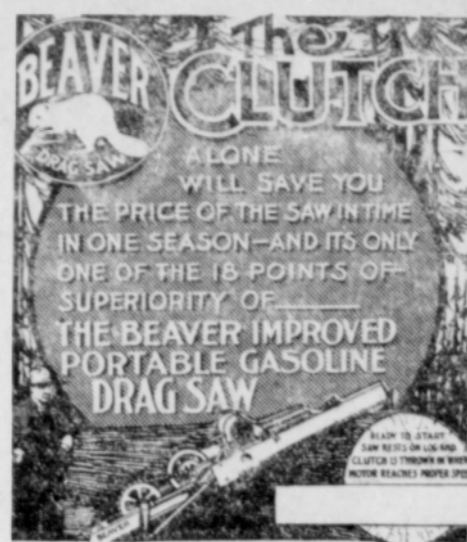

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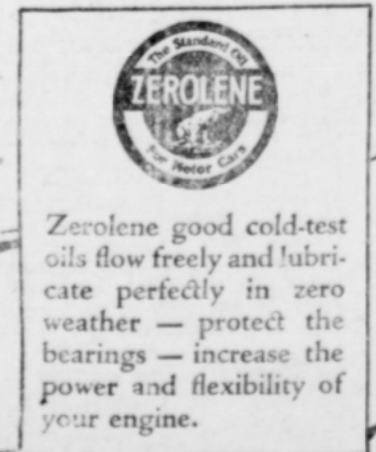
