SCHOOL BILL CARRIED.
It is evident that the school bill was the center of the political storm which has hovered over Oregon during the past few months and on last Tuesday broke in a down pour of votes which carried the bill by a large margin, elected Pierce for governor and Watkins for congress, contrary to all the established traditions of the state.

It is evident that it was a large slump of republican votes to the democratic side which has changed the political complexion of the state. For, with the exception of governor, and congressman in district No. 3, there can be said to have been elected throughout the state the number of republican candidates to be expected in a state with as large a republican registration as the records show.

There is no possible reason for Pierce's overwhelming vote except that he favored the school bill which Olcott openly opposed. There is every reason to believe that if Olcott had favored the school bill, with unquestioned sincerity, he would have been elected.

There were other reasons which defeated McArthur, and probably the chief opposition of the ex-service men on account of McArthur's vote on the bonus bill.

Some have intimated an explanation of the defeat of both the governor and congressman on the ground that they seemed to consider themselves too big for their party and showed a tendency to dictate instead of listening to advice from their party leaders. It is said by some good republicans that these candidates felt too sure of their election and the voters are liable to hand candidates a surprise when that is the case.

In Multnomah county the republican voters after scoring a good majority for democratic governor and congressman go down the line of republican candidates for the legislature, senate, judgeships and other offices, voting an almost solid republican ticket.

Those who were elected, almost to a man, had the endorsement of the patriotic societies which endorsed the educational bill. Hence we believe the issue involved in the bill controlled the voter in his and her choice of candidates, regardless of political party.

The situation thus developed presents to the political leader, or aspirant, some serious problems for consideration.

ARMISTICE DAY.
Tomorrow this country and the Allied nations will celebrate Armistice Day. But it will not be altogether what was probably anticipated four years ago. Peace practically obtains among the nations of Europe but there are undercurrents of dissatisfaction and rumblings of threatened strife.

TELEPHONE CO. BALKS AT RATE REDUCTION
Petition for an injunction restraining the state public service commission from putting into effect an order for reduced telephone rates was filed in the district court in Portland last Wednesday by the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company after the Public Service Commission had issued an order on the previous day to cut the rates.

The petition asking for the injunction says the order, which was to have gone into effect December 1, affects 49,000 subscribers throughout the state, and would cut \$200,000 a year from the revenues of the company preventing it from earning more than 1.5 per cent on its investment in this state.

The rate reduction ordered by the commission averages from 7 to 25 per cent, affecting principally users of ten-party and four-party residence and business telephones.

In an order handed down by the state public service commission at Portland last Monday afternoon, telephone rates throughout Oregon are reduced from 7 to 25 per cent on certain classes of service, pending such period as shall be found necessary by the commission to obtain information by a thorough investigation, on which to base a permanent rate schedule on all classes of service furnished by the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Co.

The temporary order was signed by Newton McCoy, chairman, and T. M. Kerrigan, commissioner. The third member of the body, H. H. Corey, wrote that he refused to "dignify these remarks (of the other two commissioners) by calling the same an order."

Order in Effect December 1.
The new rate schedule has been ordered to become effective from and after December 1. In ordering the temporary reduction the commission divided the state up into six groups.

Group No. 1 comprises certain classes of service furnished in the city of Portland. Groups 2, 3, 4 and 5 effect all towns and communities outside of Portland in the state that have a minimum population of a certain number, though this number is not stated in the order.

In these groups the business suburban ten-party lines are reduced from \$3.50 to \$3.25 a month. For residence service, four-party, code ringing lines, the rate is cut from \$2.25 to \$1.75 a month; on suburban ten-party lines from \$2.50 to \$2 a month.

In the sixth group, including all places are not listed in any of the other mentioned groups the charge on business service, code ringing suburban ten-party, code ringing lines for \$3.50 to \$3.25 a month; on residence service, code ringing four-party lines from \$2 to \$1.50 a month; on suburban ten-party, code ringing lines for residences from \$2.50 to \$2 a month.

POTATOES, APPLES, HEAVY CROPS HERE
The crop report, as of November 1, of the United States Department of Agriculture, covering this section, gives the estimated yield of potatoes for the United States at 433,000,000 bushels, which is an increase of about 25 per cent over last year.

From most sections of the country reports of shortage of cars, lack of storage space and low quality of crop are restricting harvesting operations, which, combined with low prices and small demand will probably result in many fields not being dug. In the Pacific Northwest, the Oregon and Washington crops appear to be about the same as last year, but Idaho promises about 40 per cent increase.

The picking of apples is practically completed, and storage space is filled to capacity. Car shortage is restricting movement. About 150,000 boxes (mostly Oregon product) have already moved from Portland by water and other cargoes are due to move very shortly. Reports for the Pacific Northwest indicate that worm damage has resulted in a smaller proportion than usual of fancy and extra fancy grades. It is reported that growers sprayed as usual, but the spray was less effective because of worms coming out in almost continuous hatch instead of in broods at distinct intervals as in ordinary seasons.

The United States commercial apple crop is now estimated at 31,501,000 barrels, or 95,703,000 bushels, which is a slight increase over the estimate of a month ago, and about 50 per cent increase over the United States crop of last year. Apple markets are very unsatisfactory to growers, the prevailing price being very much below the price of a year ago. The surplus of ordinary farm apples has largely been used for cider or allowed to go to waste.
