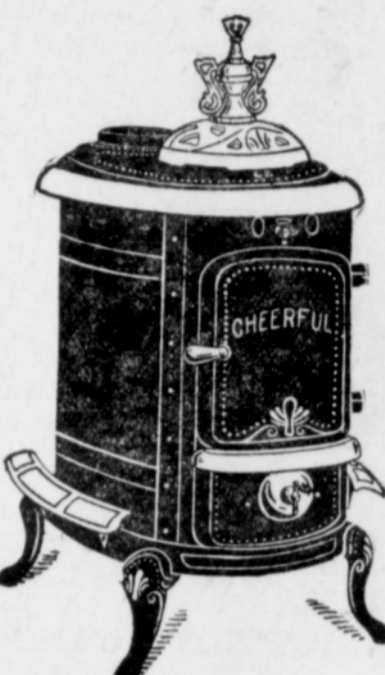

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VICTIM OF ACCIDENT LAID TO FINAL REST

The funeral services of Samuel H. Sheller who was struck by an automobile on Sunday evening and instantly killed, were held at the Methodist Episcopal church in Gresham on Wednesday afternoon. The Rev. A. S. Hisey preached the funeral sermon. The body was laid to rest in Multnomah cemetery beside those of the wife and daughter of the deceased.

Samuel Heaston Sheller was born in Clay county, Illinois, July 10, 1853. He married Miss Mary B. Huffman at Rentchler, Illinois, December 29, 1881. Soon after this the young people moved to Parsons, Kansas, where they made their home for several years and where their three children were born. In 1893 the family moved to Lanark, Illinois, and later to Vinton, Iowa. In 1900 they moved to Sunnyside, Washington, and in 1910 to Gresham which has been the family home since then. Mrs. Sheller is survived by a son, Lee Roy and a daughter, Mrs. John Ide, both residing near Gresham. Mrs. Sheller and one daughter, Clara, died in 1916.

Mr. Sheller suffered a stroke of paralysis last May from which he partially recovered. Since that time was converted and joined the Methodist church and was exceedingly happy in his new-found faith.
