GROWERS PROTEST HIGH FREIGHT RATES

The following letter, dated November 15, was sent to the secretary of the Interstate Commerce Commission at Washington, D. C., by the manager of the Gresham Cooperative Berry Growers:

Hon. Sec'y of The Interstate Commerce Commission, Washington, D. C. Dear Sir:—We note that your honorable commission will consider the question of a 12 1/2 per cent increase in railway express rates on fresh berry shipments on the 20th inst.

The truth is, the rates are so high now that the shipment of fresh berries to the eastern markets is prohibitive and entirely out of line with market values.

We lost heavily on car lot shipments during the past season and unless there is either an advance in values next year or a reduction in express rates or both we will not make any eastern shipments next year.

On behalf of 275 growers owning over 1000 acres of berries in this district I beg of you to revise the express rates downward as the current rate is too high in proportion to the value of the product.

NUTRITION SPECIALIST TALKS ON FOOD

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cent less meat than they did before the war.

Not many housewives realize how important vegetables are as a food. Vegetables are high in minerals and vitamins and contain a good quantity of protein which completes the three essential things necessary to growth and maintenance.

They are also high in roughage and contain some energy. It is a well known fact that body heat and activity are derived from the energy in foods as eaten.

Since vegetables contain all of the food values, the housewives are asked to serve one and two, if possible, vegetables besides potatoes each day with a leafy vegetable at least three times a week.

The leafy vegetables are spinach and all kinds of greens, celery, cabbage, lettuce, oyster plant and others. Leaves are rich in vitamins and energy. Cabbage and lettuce are not quite so good as the other leafy vegetables as they are bleached out. The dark green leaves are preferable.

The general rule regarding fruit is to serve fruit at least once a day. Children under five should have fresh fruit at least four times a week.

The amounts given for the amount of fats required include butter and all other fats used.

Use sugar sparingly. Depend on fruits and vegetables for sugar in its most healthful form.

Thousand Island Dressing. One cup mayonnaise dressing, three-fourths cup whipped cream, one hard boiled egg chopped, two tablespoons chili chopped, one teaspoonful Worcestershire sauce, one tablespoon tomato catsup, two tablespoons chopped pimento, one tablespoon chopped parsley, one tablespoon chopped celery, onion juice, salt and paprika to taste. This same recipe may also be used in French dressing instead of mayonnaise.

Vegetable Chowder.

Two small carrots or turnips, one-fourth small cabbage or one small cauliflower or one cup cooked string beans, one-third cup brown rice or macaroni or two medium sized potatoes, one cup of peas or corn or lima beans freshly cooked or canned, one medium sized onion, two ounces of bacon, salt, pepper to taste. Put the bacon of uncooked vegetables through the food chopper. Brown bacon, rice and onion together in the chowder kettle. Add the other vegetables, nearly cover with boiling water and cook until tender being careful not to over-cook. Add scalded milk and season with salt and pepper. Any other combination of vegetables may be used.

BORING CLUB IS CONDUCTING DANCES

Only members of the club can attend the dances and they pay a membership fee of \$1 which also grants them admission to the hall.

The sheriff's office at Oregon City does not believe that this form of evading the law by turning a public dance hall into an amusement club will be declared legal if tried out by law as no other form of amusement is provided, other than dancing. The submission of the entire matter to the grand jury is being considered. The fact that a man who gave his name as Arthur Gray of Sandy was arrested last Saturday night for being intoxicated at the dance by Sheriff W. J. Wilson and deputies Long and Hughes of Oregon City puts an unfavorable light on the situation.
