

**Farm Reminders.**

Exercise for the brood sow in winter is an excellent tonic. Pasture if available is a wonderful help. Grain is always fed with the pasture to obtain the best results. If pasture is not available, use some other form of roughage, such as alfalfa or clover hay or roots. It will make your sow stronger and better able to produce a strong litter if these points are carried out.

Poultry yards near the brooder house should be disinfected with lime

and turned under and a crop grown to renew the soil.

A light near the ceiling of the poultry house is only half as good as one near the floor. Reflectors save light.

Pullets about mature are susceptible to leg weakness or paralysis. Watch the feed supply, especially kale and buttermilk.

Plant barley or oats and vetch now for green feed next spring. Kale often freezes so it is well to have other green feed to depend on. It is better to have too much green feed than not enough.

**CORBETT PICTURES SEEN IN WEST VIRGINIA**

The last issue of the Extension Service News from O. A. C. tells of a letter received by James T. Jardine, director of the Experiment station written by H. C. Newlands, formerly connected with the School of Forestry at the agricultural college in which he tells of seeing "an interesting picture illustrating your stump burning experiment" at Huntington, West Virginia. These motion pictures were taken at Corbett during the course of stump burning demonstrations conducted there under the auspices of the college.

Since the demonstrations in Multnomah county, nothing further has been heard of this new discovery of burning stumps. The extension service news announces some demonstrations which are to be given in the future in the various ways which it might be well to mention with the number of demonstrations requested: Those arranged through the county agents are Benton, 2; Columbia, 3; Clatsop, 2; Douglas, 2; Lincoln, 3; Linn, 1; Clackamas, 2; Lane, 2; Polk, 1; Tillamook, 3; Washington, 2. Requests have also been received by the extension service from individuals in Yamhill, Marion, Hood River, and Coos counties, which are without extension agents. Demonstrations will also be arranged in these counties according to the Extension Service News.
