SCHOOL ELECTION TOMORROW.

A special school meeting of Gresham District No. 4 will be held tomorrow afternoon promptly at 2 o'clock at the schoolhouse.

At this meeting a proposal is to be presented to purchase two acres adjoining the present school grounds on the west. It will be shown that this is needed to meet the needs of the growing grade school which is now rather crowded with nearly 300 pupils.

In order to back up the board in its efforts to meet the requirements of a strictly first-class grade school there should be a large attendance at the school meeting tomorrow.

Property owners and tax payers may vote at the school meeting.
