This is the flag that Comrade Butler defended, which guarantees to us our liberties, which we are enjoying today as American citizens. Therefore be it

Resolved, that in the passing of Comrade Butler this nation has lost a brave defender, the state, county, and the city of Fairview an honorable citizen, the family a kind husband and father, M. A. Ross Post No. 41, G. A. R., Department of Oregon, a valuable member, and be it further

Mr. and Mrs. Jay Radford spent Thanksgiving with Mr. and Mrs. Davis of Cottrell.

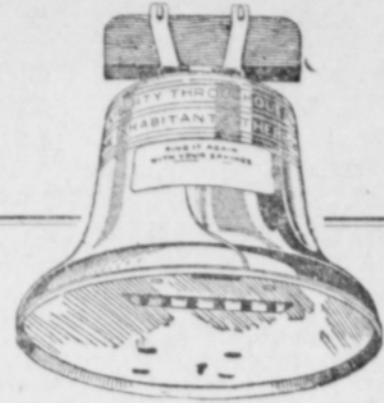
Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Wilkenson entertained on Sunday their sons Ray, from Portland, and Charlie and wife of this place.
