OREGON LEGISLATURE

Lawmakers Assemble; Governors Recommend

The Oregon legislative assembly began its 32d session yesterday. Hon. Walter M. Pierce was inaugurated governor, Jay H. Upton of Crook county, was chosen president of the senate and K. K. Kubli, of Portland, speaker of the house. George Joseph occupied so much time in a tirade against Upton that the inauguration, which was to have been in the afternoon was delayed until evening, and the new governor did not get to Portland for an evening reception as planned.

Ben W. Oleott, the retiring republican governor, ending his 12 years of public office, addressed a short farewell message to the lawmakers and turned over his cares to Pierce of Umatilla county, a democrat, who thus reaches a long sought pinnacle of political power.

It is well that readers should note carefully the recommendations of the outgoing and incoming executives. The Outlook is indebted to the Morning Oregonian for the following summary of the messages:

Governor Oleott Recommends. Legislature urged to give careful attention to soldiers' loan act.

Recommendation that Old Oregon Trail be dedicated in honor of pioneers. Legislation urged striking at illicit and illegal use of narcotic with penitentiary terms for third offenders.

Recommendation that constitutional amendments be approved confining activities of special legislative sessions to subject matter in executive call.

Hope expressed for continuance of prospective in Oregon and success of new administration.

Legislature asked to encourage efficient management of state institution rather than handicap them by cutting off adequate appropriations.

Governor Pierce Recommends. Elimination of all extravagance in approving appropriations to the end that highway commissioners be practiced by the state during the present biennium.

Consolidation and elimination of many commissions and boards.

That public service commission, state industrial accident commission and department of fisheries be placed on self-sustaining basis through revised system of fees.

Elimination of appropriation for tourist association.

Reduction in scope of extension department work at University of Oregon and Oregon Agricultural college.

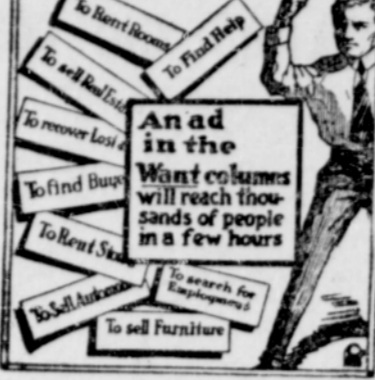
Elimination of exhibition of Oregon products in Portland, now costing the state \$10,000 annually.

Refusal of legislature to grant further increases in salaries of state officials or institutional heads.

Income tax and severance tax as means of reducing materially the burden of taxation on real estate.
