POSTAL RECEIPTS MAKE BIG GAIN

Postal receipts of the Gresham office for the past quarter were \$2509.92 as compared with \$1971.11 for the same period last year, being a gain of 25 per cent, according to Postmaster Elisabeth E. Johnson.

"Reports from all parts of the country indicate that the volume of mail handled during the holiday season broke all previous records. The post-office department being in such close touch with the economic life of the country, reflects in a marked degree business conditions both in times of depression and prosperity. Hence the increase in the business of the post-office department during the past year is a favorable sign of the return of normal conditions in business," says Miss Johnson.

Many inquiries have come to the Gresham postmaster recently in regard to the delivery of mail in Gresham, which have been forwarded to the postoffice department. The following reply has been received from the first assistant postmaster general:

"In answer to your letter of the 16th ultimo relative to the establishment of village delivery service, you are informed that village delivery service may be established at any village or town having a population according to the last Federal or State Census of at least 1500 residing in territory possessing requisite civic improvements and having gross postal receipts of at least \$5000 for the preceding fiscal year.

"In view of the fact that the population of Gresham is only 1200, no action will be taken at this time looking to the establishment of such service."

Postal receipts for the year are well above the figures mentioned. The requisite civic improvements referred to are sidewalks, names of streets posted and houses numbered. In view of the steady growth of the town and the extension of the city limits, it is believed that the next census will show the necessary population.
