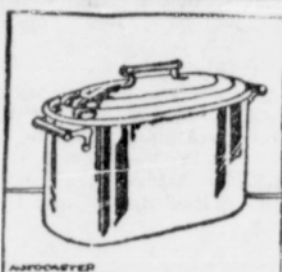

**Multnomah Farm Bureau to Elect Officers.**

The Multnomah County Farm Bureau will hold a meeting next Friday afternoon, January 19, in Gresham in Metzger's hall at 1:30. One of the purposes of the meeting will be to elect new officers for this year.

Multnomah county leads all other counties in the state in the number of registered motor vehicles this year which has reached a total of 46,850 which is over one-third the number of motor vehicles registered in the state. Clackamas county has 6,039 registered motor vehicles this year. The total number of motor vehicles registered in Oregon during the period of Jan. 1 to Dec. 31, 1922, aggregated 134,566 according to a report prepared by the secretary of state.
