The automobile which burned was a Maxwell. It was insured for \$500 through the insurance agency represented by John Brown of Gresham.

Mr. and Mrs. A. Gribble of Portland were Sunday guests at the home of Wm. Morand and family.

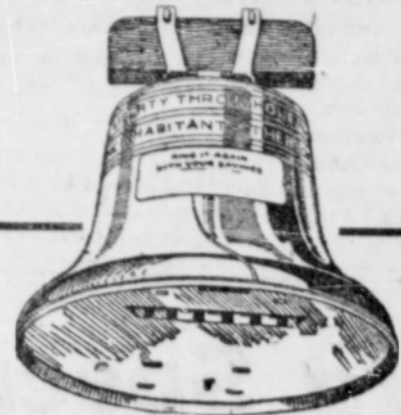
An O. A. C. expert is to give cooking demonstrations at the Union school-house Tuesday and Wednesday of this week.
