This has appeared from the fact that whenever the county farm is referred to in daily papers and figures are given it is invariably with an unbusinesslike indefiniteness and with the clear implication that the farm is a poor investment and a heavy loss to the county.

One day during the fore part of the month many of the neighbors of the local road district attended court at Oregon City, to remonstrate against a petition that was sponsored by some of the prominent citizens of the south half, to divide the district on a straight line running east and west over the Hoffmeister road, which passes the Roberts farm.

Why should not this delivery of marketable produce furnished various county institutions be regarded as a cash purchase and a warrant issue to pay for same, and said warrant be turned in to the credit of the county farm?

There may be a reason that we do not know why this could not be done. If it could be done the records would be more complete and probably the county farm would be shown to be a profitable institution of the county and not a failure and a heavy expense to the taxpayers as now so often is made to appear.

total attendance at the meetings where they were shown 12,590. Much work was done to help the farmers get rid of the ground squirrels, gophers, moles and rodent and insect pests by use of poison grain and traps.

Extension Service Doing Splendid Work.

The work of the extension service is said to have been indorsed at 50 meetings of the taxpayers during the past two years. When representatives of the service appeared before the state legislature at Salem last week to ask for an appropriation of \$62,600.76, there was found to be some opposition to the service by Senators La Pollett, Taylor and Zimmerman who took the stand against it but the friends of the service were found to be more numerous.

Combination Salmon Salad.
