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"HERE'S TO YOUR HEALTH."

There was a time when it was thought that the length and fullness of life was determined by Jove. Jove was assisted by Themis, the god of law, who issued his decrees. These decrees were executed by the daughters of law, Clotho, Lachesis and Atropos. Clotho was the spinner of the thread of life; Lachesis held it and measured off its span, and Atropos with scissors clipped it and thus terminated the life. It was believed that man had no control over the fates. He could not alter or change his destiny.

The above reads strangely in this day. More and more men are beginning to see that the length of their lives is a matter largely of their own determination. Doubtless any person of sufficient age and mental development to be able to exercise will power and reasonable judgment can prolong his life beyond what would be its length without that effort. This, of course, implies that one has not already become so weakened by disease as to make the exercise of his will power ineffectual.

On the other hand, there is no doubt that any one can be careless neglect or intentional abuse of his physical powers hasten the time of his demise. There are various ways to commit suicide. There are quick ways and there are slow ways. We do not hesitate to say that we believe from all the facts which have come to our attention that more lives are shortened by over-eating, or improper food, than by any other cause.

"Well, but when a man's time comes he will have to go anyway and he can't help himself." So say some, and if that is true then the reverse is true, that no one can by any means whatever shorten the pre-determined length of his life. But this is a fatalistic view which is neither logical, philosophical nor christian, and is not true. To admit its truth is to deny so many other things accepted as true that the basis of human reason, volition and accountability is swept away.

The view is coming to prevail that man is morally responsible for the exercise of his best judgment and care in preserving his physical and mental health and strength and prolonging his life within reasonable limits. Whatever happy prospects the future life may be considered as holding for one, he is not to be excused, if he is a normal man, for neglecting to care for himself here and by such neglect shortening his life.

It is understood that a life may be legitimately sacrificed for a necessary principle or a greater good to a larger number, but self-preservation is still the first law of life, and far from being selfish this may be prompted by the worthiest of motives. Medical science, mental science and physical culture have in these latter days actually lengthened the average span of life.

Never before in the world's history has so much thought and study been devoted to the science of health and the art of living. Medical science is advancing more rapidly than disease and there is reason to believe that in time every ill human flesh is heir to will be subdued if not conquered. Health helps are multiplied and made available to all.

Hand in hand with the building up of a good character should go to the building up of physical health that one may live the useful and happy life the fullness of one's days.

APPLE GROWERS PROVE COUE THEORY.

Coue is right. In the most unexpected places the world is getting better and better, or rather more efficient. Take, for instance, certain Far Western nurserymen. When they got ready to produce Spitzenberg and Jonathan apple trees, they picked out any old Spitzenberg and Jonathan tree in the neighborhood, cut off the bud wood they needed and did their grafting, with the result that many a fruit grower found after six or seven expensive years that his apple trees wouldn't bear enough fruit to pay expenses. The bud wood had been taken from sick or lazy trees and their shortcomings had been transmitted to all the nursery stock.

Now the nurserymen are starting an orchard of tested, high-bearing trees with known records. When it reaches maturity, its trees will supply the bud wood for all the nurseries of all the members and one important source of horticultural failure will be done away with.—March Sunset.

Ford Sounds Car Shortage Warning.

A recent car shortage warning issued by the Ford Motor Company through its various branches calls attention to the fact that the demand for Ford cars at the present time is more than 100 per cent over the demand a year ago.

In December, 1922, there were 105,799 Ford cars and trucks delivered to retail buyers as against 50,203 for the same period in 1921. January sales for the first 20 days for which information is now available, shows sales at the rate of 120,000 for the month, while advance estimates received from dealers for February delivery show orders for 147,000 already booked.

This February demand is 20,000 cars and trucks in excess of the production capacity for February with the plant working on the new schedule which is aiming at 6,000 cars a day as soon as material and equipment can be put on the right basis for this colossal manufacturing achievement.

Sales during the past six months have entirely depleted all dealer and factory reserves and cars are now being shipped to fill actual orders on hand, with more orders piling up every day than can be filled by the production department.

The 1923 schedule of 6,000 cars a day means 150,000 cars a month but it is taking time to reach the maximum daily production capacity for it means an increase of 50 per cent over the record breaking performance of 1922.

In the warning issued by the Ford Motor Company the statement is made that the announcement is to enable buyers to protect themselves on delivery and that the shortage will apply to tractors and trucks as well as Ford cars.

Managers of the various Ford Branches throughout the country are issuing supplementary warning to all dealers in their territory to schedule orders as far in advance as possible and at the same time are insisting that all orders scheduled shall apply on retail buyers orders actually on hand.

On certain models there is already a pronounced shortage and all shipments are being made on a pro-rata basis in proportion to the actual orders on hand.

Ford production for the year is estimated at 1,800,000 cars while the actual production of all makes will reach 3,000,000, according to the largest figures available from the factory departments of the better known manufacturers.

This means that Ford production will total 60 per cent of the entire car production of the United States for 1923. The highest per cent ever reached before by the Ford Motor Company was in 1921 when 57 per cent of all cars built for the year were Fords.
