### DAMASCUS FARM BUREAU TO HEAR SPECIALIST

Ira N. Gabrielson, assistant biologist in charge of rodent control operations in Oregon, will discuss rodent control at the meeting of the Damascus Farm Bureau to be held Saturday evening, March 3, at the Union schoolhouse. Mr. Gabrielson has made an extensive study of the various kinds of rodents found on the coast and can tell how to get rid of gray diggers, rats, moles, etc., which destroy grain, potatoes and other crops in the field and also after they have been placed in storage. Mr. Gabrielson has had many years of experience in the work of exterminating these pests.
