**BIG THINGS PLANNED BY COMMUNITY COUNCIL**

Perhaps one of the largest undertakings which the Community Council has ever attempted has been placed on the program for this year. It is a Fourth of July celebration. The place where it is to be held has not yet been decided. Definite plans will be taken up at the next meeting of the Council.

A special meeting of the Community Council was held Thursday evening at Pleasant Home at the Methodist parsonage. There was a good representation present of all of the districts included in the council. This special meeting was called for the purpose of completing arrangements for the fight for clean concessions at the county fair. The regular meeting of the council was to have been held on Monday evening, March 5, but as the Multnomah county fair board was also scheduled to hold a meeting on that same evening, it was decided to call a special meeting of the community council and cancel the regular meeting for Monday evening.

This offer was accepted by the council who appointed a committee of three to work with the grange committee. Those chosen were Chas. Gossett, G. Nasshahn and Miss Elva Dolan.

The next meeting of the Community Council is to be held about May 1.

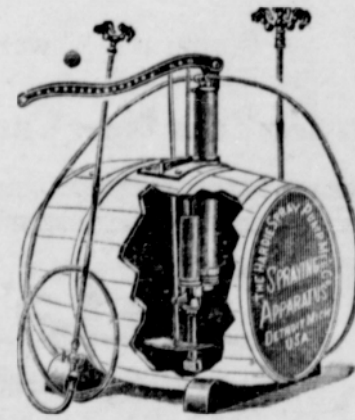
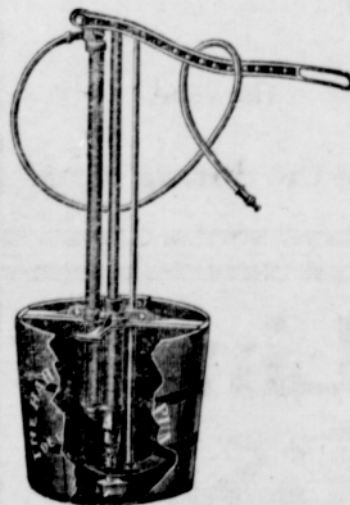
