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AMERICAN LEGION

The American Legion will surely become a permanent national organization if the actions of the legionnaires of Oregon as expressed at The Dalles and LaGrande district conferences are to be taken as evidence, stated George R. Wilbur from Hood River, state commander of the Legion of Oregon.

Believing that the organization will continue as an exponent of their purpose, ex-service men in every corner of Oregon are "digging in" and looking to the erection of suitable homes and clubhouses, community gathering places, civic prosperity, promoting proper observance of patriotic occasions, organizing boy scout troops, building parks, roads, tourist camps. It has been found that these communities are taking considerable interest in legion activities, declared Mr. Wilbur.

American Legion auxiliary units have been recently formed to Legion posts in Stanfield, Monroe, Echo and North Bend, Oregon. The mothers, wives, sisters and daughters of members of the American Legion comprise the auxiliary membership.

July 14, 15 and 16 have been set as the dates for the 1923 annual Mt. Hood climb of the Hood River American Legion. With the Legion posts and state officials, Hood River legionnaires will have with them on the climb members of the Oregon state Editorial association whose 1923 state convention convenes in Hood River this summer.

The American Legion, through its 11,000 posts scattered over the entire world, has set about to raise a permanent endowment fund of \$100,000 for the purpose of decorating on each Memorial Day, May 30, the graves of all Americans of the late World War. The Legion realizes all too well that the time will soon come when it must pass out of existence just as the Grand Army of the Republic is doing today. The permanent fund will insure this sacred task of being carried out for all time to come.
