GOLF CLUB GROUNDS ADJOINING GRESHAM

A. Swanson and C. E. Putnam, representing the Rock Springs country club, were in Gresham today in the interests of this newly formed club. As reported in a recent Outlook the grounds acquired comprise the Bowman place of 180 acres, located at the Twelve-Mile corners.

An announcement of the plans has been made in a letter as follows:

"All golfers recognize the need of more links, the older clubs are full, and the municipal courses are overcrowded; golf is here to stay and there is a constantly increasing number of players.

"As the golf playing public is scattered over the city, it is impossible to reach personally the players that would like to consider affiliating with this club, and we are sending out this letter to a number of representative business and professional men to acquaint them with our general plans giving them or their friends an opportunity to get in touch with us.

"Those affiliating at this time will get a share that will be much more valuable within a year, and they can justly feel proud that they have had a part in the building of this club and park that will doubtless be a permanent and growing asset to the shareholders and community.

"We cannot go into further detail in this letter, except to state that our plans are well under way with 176 of the 300 shares that will be offered at this time, definitely subscribed. Also that following the completion of the golf links will come the club house, a 60-acre park, croquet grounds, tennis courts, lakes and fish ponds, and other things that will not only make this an attractive place for the golfer, but for his family as well."

This new enterprise is being backed by substantial men and has great promise of success. Its nearness to Gresham, and accessibility from Portland, Fairview, Troutdale and surrounding territory makes it certain that many local golfers will be interested in the plans, the development of which will be of material benefit to eastern Multnomah.
