EGYPTIAN DISCOVERER PASSES.
The Earl of Carnarvon died yesterday at Cairo as the result of pneumonia following poisoning from an insect bite.

Through his recent discovery of the tomb of Pharaoh Tutankhamen in Egypt, said to be one of the richest depositaries of archeological relics, Lord Carnarvon has gained wide publicity and has greatly enriched our historical knowledge of the old Egyptians. The find is said to be valued at \$15,000,000. According to the arrangement with the present Egyptian government, one-half of the relics will remain in an Egyptian museum and the other half will probably find places in British and American museums.

It will doubtless be claimed by the superstitious that Lord Carnarvon's fate was decreed by the offended deities as a punishment for his sacrilege in invading the courts of the dead. Probably no argument against this belief would convince the incredulous mind but to all who invite enlightenment there must appear good reasons for not viewing the death of the explorer as a divine punishment.

Lord Carnarvon is said to have spent more than a hundred thousand dollars of his own funds in bringing his discovery to the light of modern day. He had associated with him a Dr. Carter of the United States who is doubtless well qualified and will continue the exploration and preparation and distribution of the relics.

HOW ABOUT \$14,310,200,000.
While the New York slickers are busy trying to steal a few hundred thousand dollars from one another calling the accomplishment a day of good business, while the Broadway lounge lizards are cluttering the streets of our cities and boring us with their silly chatter, the great American farmer comes along with a production of goods worth \$14,310,200,000 for the year 1922. When one thinks of this accomplishment in terms of service to America, everything else vanishes from view.

The crops harvested during the year were worth \$8,961,000,000, while the value of farm animals and animal products footed up to \$5,349,200,000.

The outlook for 1923 is even brighter.

The spending power of country America almost staggers the imagination even as it is, and with a steady growth in sight.

The year 1922 shows an increase of nearly \$2,000,000,000 over 1921. What the increase for 1923 will be is speculative.

Texas led all the states in 1922 in the value of farm crops and animals, footing up to a value of \$1,001,500,000, Iowa came second, and Illinois third.

WONDERS INCREASE.
The latest discovery in connection with the wireless is that the apparently deaf can often hear its music and messages. This fact has been demonstrated in several recent instances in and near Gresham. Persons who cannot hear ordinary sounds, and those who have not for a long time or for life heard the spoken voice or musical sound, have had their faces lighten with the joy of hearing audible and intelligible vibrations.

The secret of it seems to be that the radio wave is of a more penetrating length which an ear, deaf to ordinary sound waves, can perceive.

The next remarkable development of radio will probably be the perfecting of means by which pictures and scenes may be transmitted over any distance. Edouard Belin, a distinguished French scientist, is working on an invention which he calls the "telephoto" which is designed to accomplish this. Also Nicola Tesla, the American wizard of wireless, is experimenting along the same line and says that seeing by wireless will be accomplished within a short time.
