

FATHER AND SON BANQUET BIG
SUCCESS; FINE SPEAKERS HEARD

The banquet given on Wednesday evening to the boys of the community and their fathers or adult companions was considered a great success. It was managed by a general committee of men and women with Mayor K. A. Miller at the head. The Rev. H. R. Gebhardt was chairman of the refreshment committee, which did most excellent work in securing and serving the food, which was abundant and good. Fully 225 persons sat down to the tables, which filled every available space of the main room of the grange hall. The Rev. D. Q. Barry was called on for the invocation. Following the meal several songs were sung, with the Rev. A. S. Hisey as song leader and Dr. H. V. Adix as pianist. The program of speeches consisted of talks by Judge Kanzler, of the court of domestic relations, George W. Stapleton, presiding circuit judge, Chas. A. Lyon, head of the Big Brother Farm and C. M. Quicksall, principal of the Gresham grade school.

Judge Kanzler characterized the gathering as a genuine inspiration and a most encouraging thing in the community. It is quite important, he said, to "sell the daddies to the boys and the boys to the daddies." Each should learn the value of the other and they should learn to be pals. He urged one standard of morality for boys and girls. They are the most precious thing of our generation, he said. He sounded a note of warning against an insidious movement going on in our midst to tear down our government, religion and homes and urged that all look the crisis squarely

in the face and be prepared to defend these institutions.

Judge Stapleton addressed his remarks mostly to the parents present and urged them to know where their boys are spending their idle time and what they are doing. He emphasized the duty of every parent to teach obedience to the laws of the land and patriotism. The schools should be held up to high standards. The judge believes that the churches are too conservative in their methods of dealing with the young and that carefully chosen pictures should be used to teach lessons, religion and morals.

Mr. Lyon engaged the eager attention of the boys by telling them the story of a dog which he owned in his boyhood. He brought out striking resemblances between a boy and a dog and called attention to characteristics, good and bad, from which he drew fine moral lessons. "Towser was a great fighter," said Mr. Lyon, "but he didn't use any judgment and was wont to pick a fight. Towser loved to play, but he didn't always play the game square. Towser was jealous. Towser was a good judge of human nature. He did not like the man who would not look him squarely in the eye. He had a bad habit of running away, which resulted, finally, in his death."

Mr. Quicksall gave a short talk on the necessity and value of play and urged fathers to safeguard against the wrong kind of play by teaching the right kind and playing with the children. He had planned to demonstrate some simple games but the lack of room made it impossible.

Mayor Miller acted as toastmaster.

BOYS AND GIRLS WILL
HAVE SUMMER SCHOOL

One of the fine opportunities offered to club members is the two weeks course at the O. A. C., June 11 to 23. Boys and girls come from all parts of the state, several hundred in number. They are state champions, whose tuition is paid by business men of the state, delegates, who are sent by their club, and members who wish to pay their own expense of \$15 for board and room.

Members are housed under the most careful supervision and the day is so full that very little mischief has an opportunity to enter in. The mornings are filled with classes conducted by the regular college instructors. Classes in poultry, livestock, garden and field crops, household decoration, kitchen efficiency, canning, cooking and millinery. Note books are used to list information which is brought to the club at home.

The afternoon is given over to an assembly, athletics, gymnasium and swimming. The evenings are supervised in play and entertainments. Those who attend get an inspiration for a college education, a resolve to be a more useful citizen.

Many clubs have selected delegates, earning the funds in interesting ways. The seven clubs at Gilbert put on a paper drive earning \$44. The cookery club there has sold buns, cakes and ice cream to the school. The Parent-Teacher association is sponsoring an evening's entertainment and box social, and later will hold a school fair, with exhibits, booths, athletics, and a chicken supper. The profits are to be divided among the clubs.

The Lynch poultry club gave a club play, songs and dance. The home making club is to follow with a similar evening. The Parent-Teacher association of Pleasant Valley has given a tea and is pushing a paper drive.

Russellville and Buckley sewing clubs each have two delegates chosen. Others taking up the scheme are Gresham sewing club, Powell Valley boy's clubs, Orient sewing club, Sylvan and Maplewood cookery clubs.

Multnomah county had the largest delegation last year. This year, with 19 state champions and such a keen interest in many communities it is hoped to lead again. Parents who wish their boy or girl to enjoy a really constructive vacation can send them to no better place than to the college summer school.

R. F. WALTERS OFFERS CITY SITE
FOR RESERVOIR ON BUTTE SLOPE

The proffer of a new site for city park and storage reservoir engaged the attention of the city council at the regular meeting last Tuesday night and brought out a lively discussion. The proffer, which came as a surprise, was from R. F. Walters, who appeared before the council and made the proposition that he would give to the city of Gresham a tract of land to the limit of five acres on the north slope of the butte, if the city would enter an agreement to furnish to him free for the period of 20 years the minimum monthly supply of water, which is now sold at \$1.25. The proposition will be given careful consideration and if accepted necessary papers and agreements will be executed.

Three bids for the construction of the proposed sidewalks on West Powell street were received but none were accepted. The street committee will prepare new specifications, requiring a richer mixture of concrete, after which new bids will be called for. Walks built under the present specifications are not considered durable and an ordinance was ordered prepared covering the proposed change.

The council purchased a \$25,000 bond of the Investors' Syndicate for the purpose of accumulating a fund to retire the first water bonds issued by the city to that amount. This will call for an annual payment of \$1870 for 10 years. The initial payment was ordered made at this time.

H. W. Snashall was granted permission to have full charge of parking privileges to tourists on the fair grounds under the same conditions as last summer, water, fuel and light be-

ing furnished. A parking charge of 50 cents a day was fixed, as heretofore.

A. J. W. Brown precipitated a heated argument on the question of the sewerage coming down through the gully under Powell street which collects under his meat market and which he asserts has become a nuisance, a menace to health and a detriment to his business. He demanded that steps be taken to abate the nuisance. The matter was referred to the committee on health and police with instructions to investigate conditions and apply a remedy.
