

CLOTHING NEEDED FOR NEAR EAST RELIEF

"On my recent visit to the Near East, I was amazed to find the purchasing power of used clothing," states J. J. Handsaker, Oregon Director Near East Relief. "I found an old shirt would buy two dozen eggs, an old coat would purchase a sheep, while I saw great piles of wool and hay bought with this same legal tender."

"After only one year of peace and freedom from molestation the people will re-establish themselves so rapidly that they are sometimes able to produce enough food for their own use but clothing cannot be had for

love or money. We take advantage of this situation and exchange clothing for food. We rarely give away a garment but always require an exchange in food products or service. Recently supplies sufficient to run an orphanage for several days were secured in exchange for ten bales of old clothing which had been thrown aside as worthless by the people of America.

"We want garments with six months of wear left in them for men, women or children. Imagine what you would need in the way of clothes if for six years you had not been able to buy a garment or a yard of cloth.

Recently a million people have been made homeless and these are in greatest need while our regular everyday task is to supply clothing, food and shelter for 115,000 war orphans."
