

Salmon Patties.
 1-lb. can pink or chum salmon.
 1 1/2 cupful milk.
 3 level tablespoons flour.
 1 teaspoon salt.
 1/4 teaspoon pepper.
 Rich pastry.
 1 cupful diced celery, cooked tender
 3 tablespoons butter.
 Dash paprika.
 Prepare rich pastry and bake in hot oven on inverted gem pans. Prick sides and bottom to avoid shrinkage. Cool.
 Drain liquor from salmon and reserve for sauce. Remove bone and flake salmon. Melt butter, stir in flour and when blended add gradually, stirring constantly, the milk mixed with the salmon liquor and 1/4 cupful water in which celery was cooked. Add salmon, celery and seasonings. Reheat the pastry shells and pour hot salmon mixture in them. Serve at once. If desired, green peas may also be added.
