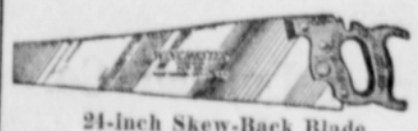

Dr. Fred Thompson and wife of The Dalles were week-end guests at the home of the former's parents, Dr. and Mrs. A. Thompson.

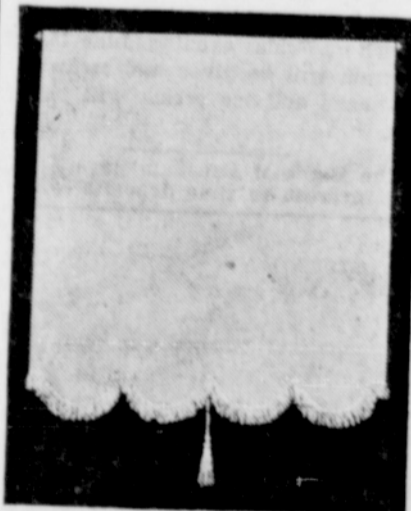
Merrill Good, a former Gresham boy, who has just completed his course at O. A. C., passed through Gresham Monday on his way to Montana.

If worms are to be kept from the cherries the fly that lays the eggs under the cherry skin must be killed before it deposits the eggs. The flies come out of the ground about the time the Royal Ann cherries begin to ripen—that is early to mid-June. Directions for spraying may be had by sending for O. A. C. station circular 35.

The most successful certified seed potato growers rogue their fields four to eight times a season. All diseased plants are removed except those attacked by late blight. Should any diseased plants appear after inspection by the college specialists they must be removed before digging time.
