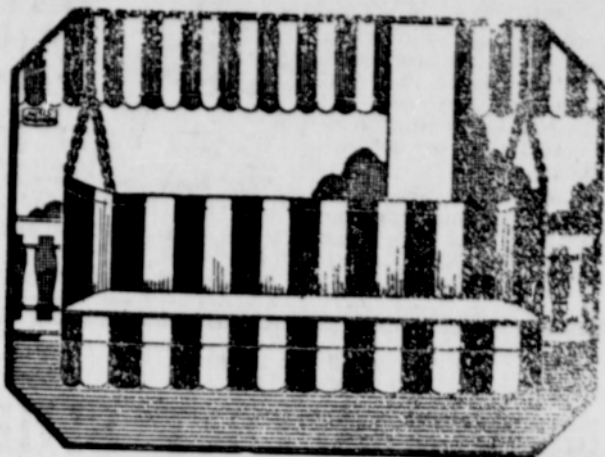


Summer Comfort

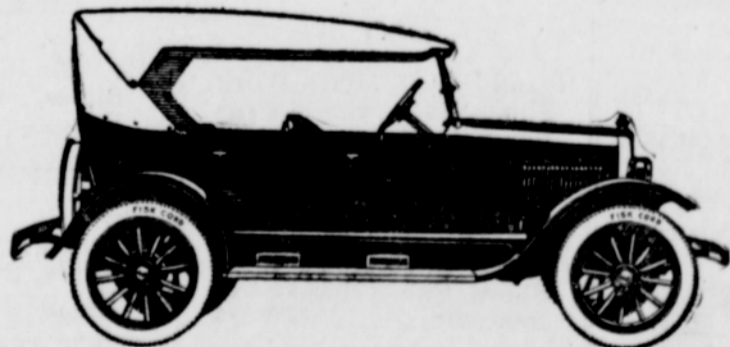
