AGED WOMAN PASSES AFTER BRIEF ILLNESS

Mrs. Jane Wilson, who suffered a stroke of paralysis on last Saturday evening at her home in Gresham, passed away Tuesday afternoon, June 19, without having regained consciousness. Her stroke came following a visit to her old friend and neighbor, Mrs. J. H. Wood, who is confined to her bed in Gresham. Mrs. Wilson, although very feeble herself, had walked several blocks to bring cheer to her friend.

Nancy Jane Massey was born in Missouri, February 11, 1847. She crossed the plains to the Oregon country with her parents when six years of age, arriving in 1853. The family settled in Lane county where they lived until 1865 when they moved to Brooks, Oregon. In 1892 she was married to James Harvey Wilson, who passed away in Gresham in 1920. She is survived by three sisters, Mrs. Mary Matheny of Troutdale, Mrs. Lizzie Long of British Columbia and Mrs. Eliza Largent of Walla Walla, and a brother, George Massey of Amity, Oregon, also four step children, C. W. and W. M. Wilson of Portland, J. E. Wilson of Gresham and Mrs. I. L. Clark of Portland.

The funeral services were held yesterday forenoon at the Methodist Episcopal church in Gresham, in charge of her pastor, the Rev. A. S. Hisey. The Rev. J. H. Wood, in a brief speech, paid tribute to the memory of a true friend whom he had known for many years. The interment was at Claggett cemetery, near Salem, where a group of old friends gathered to do honor to the memory of a good and true friend. Mrs. Wilson was converted and joined the Methodist Episcopal church in 1867 and remained a devoted and true christian to the end of her life. She was an active church worker as long as her health permitted.

Spray for Cherry Fly Now. The cherry maggot fly is just making its appearance. The cool weather has retarded its development. On cool rainy days it is not very active. However, the spray should be applied to the trees on the first dry days.

Sweetened Poison Bait Spray. Lead arsenate, half pound; molasses or syrup (never honey), 2 quarts; water, 10 gallons. This amount is sufficient for spraying approximately 50 trees.

The first spray should be applied as soon as it quits raining and the second spray should follow in about a week or ten days. In applying the spray take care to use not more material on the trees than is necessary. About one pint to one quart solution is sufficient to a full sized tree. There is no object gained by spraying the fruit itself, and heavy applications of spray apparently do no more good in maggot control and may burn the foliage. Apply the solution as fairly fine droplets to the upper surface of the outer leaves. It is advisable to spray the foliage of adjacent trees and shrubs as well.

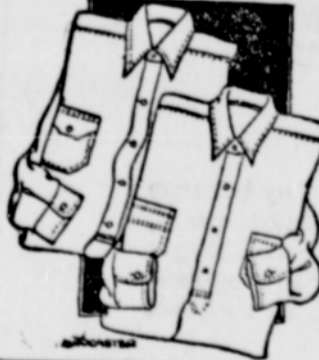
