About 20 members of the Gresham Rebekah lodge attended Utopia Rebekah Lodge No. 62 at East Sixth and Alder, Thursday evening. They saw the degree work put on in a splendid manner and met State President Edith Kelly. A fine banquet was given after the degree work. Everyone reported a very enjoyable time.

Farm Taxes.

Figures made public by the department of agriculture on increases in farm land taxation give proof of the trend of bureaucracy. A canvas shows the average amount of state, county and local taxes paid by farmers throughout the country in 1922 to have been 70.9 cents per acre, compared with 31.4 cents in 1914. This is an increase of 126 per cent—some increase. What has the farmer received for it?

To get down to particulars, Colorado farmers paid in 1914 an average of 20 cents an acre. In 1922 it had gone up to 68 cents. Wyoming rose from 19 cents to 39 cents, despite the growing returns from oil from state lands, which under proper economy ought to make Wyoming a "taxless state." New Mexico rose from 19 cents to 33 cents; Montana from 7 to 16 cents.

The figures do not include federal taxes, which have risen even higher than the local and state taxes in the period given and for which there is the war to be blamed.

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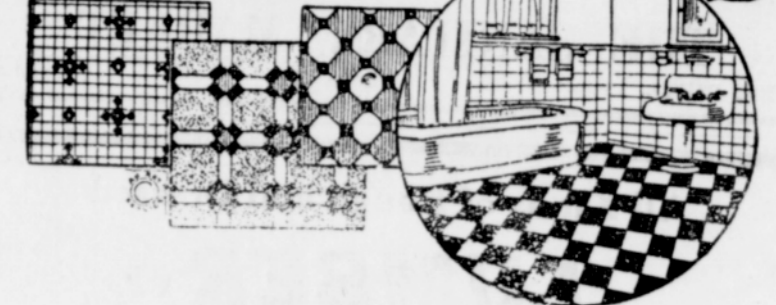
