FUNERAL SERVICES HELD FOR MRS. ELLEN SMITH

The funeral services for Mrs. Ellen A. Smith, who died suddenly at the home of her daughter, Mrs. J. H. Sharp, on last Monday, were held from the Baptist church in Gresham yesterday afternoon, the Rev. D. Q. Barry officiating. Music was furnished by Mrs. J. N. Clanahan and Miss Myrtle Rusher. Interment was in Mt. Scott cemetery.

Mrs. Smith was a daughter of Jas. J. and Jane C. Hatch. She was born and reared in a Methodist parsonage. She was a native of Williamstown, Vermont, where she was born on September 25, 1842. While she was a small child she moved with the family to Illinois and later to Wisconsin.

In May, 1862, she was united in marriage to Joel D. Axtell. To them were born three children, Mrs. Carrie E. Dimmock, now deceased, Mrs. Sharp of Gresham and Frank D. Axtell of Seal Beach, California. The husband died while the children were very young and the widow later married Edwin T. Smith.

Mr. and Mrs. Smith made their home in Wisconsin until 1905, when they came to Oregon, locating in Fairview. After a few years they moved to Newberg, where Mr. Smith passed away. For the past six years Mrs. Smith made her home in Newberg and Salem with her daughter and granddaughters. She came to Gresham a few weeks ago to make her home with Mrs. Sharp, where she passed away suddenly last Monday.

Mrs. Smith was for many years an active church worker, being particularly interested in choir work. Seven years ago she received a fall which broke her hip and since then she was obliged to walk with a crutch.

Besides the children mentioned, Mrs. Smith is survived by a brother, J. A. Hatch of Wisconsin, grandchildren and great-grandchildren and a host of friends who mourn their loss.
