DAMASCUS FARM BUREAU HOLDS GOOD MEETING

The August meeting of the Damascus Farm Bureau was held last Saturday evening and an interesting program was carried out. Walter A. Holt, county agricultural agent, explained the association agreement of the Clackamas County Cooperative Potato Growers. The normal average of potatoes in the county is about 6000 acres. Clackamas county leads the state in the production of potatoes by about 150,000 bushels. It is hoped that from 40 to 60 per cent of the growers will join the association. A minimum of 200 acres must be signed up by September 1, or the association agreement will be void.

Oran Lingle, one of those on the organization committee for this community, gave a brief report of what had been done in trying to organize potato growers in the county. Three interesting meetings have been held so far.

Fred Anderson, who represented this community in a meeting of the Oregon City Chamber of Commerce and farmers of the county on July 24, gave a brief report of the meeting. The Portland Chamber of Commerce was also represented. The consensus of opinion as expressed in the meeting was that the business men are anxious to do everything possible to bring about the prosperity of the farmer, since his prosperity is the foundation of that of the country. It was pointed out that the only way for the farmers to bring that about was for them to organize. Every other business is organized and the farmer must organize to better his condition.

Oran Lingle, farm crop project leader, reported that the first inspection of potatoes for seed certification was held recently. The fields of Walter Ramser and Mr. Lingle passed the first test. The second inspection will be held later.

Last Tuesday afternoon, Professor Link, a specialist in mosaic diseases from Washington, D. C., and Professor Hyslop of the Extension Service of O. A. C., demonstrated to farmers how to detect mosaic. Six or seven farmers were present at the demonstration, which was very interesting. Many questions were asked and answered. In this meeting Professor Hyslop stated that no American Wonder potatoes will be certified this year.

It was announced by Fred Anderson that a poultry culling demonstration would be held on August 7, at the E. Schwedler farm.

Plans for the harvest festival are under way. The committee in charge expects to put the arrangements before the people at the special meeting of the Farm Bureau on Friday evening, August 10. A large attendance of people from the community is urged and expected at that time.
