Criticism of Presidents.

Uneasy sits the man who occupies the presidential chair. The abounding and vigorous vitality of President Roosevelt was sapped so that he died comparatively young. President Wilson is still a physical wreck, and President Harding's lamented death was due in part to the strain he underwent. President Taft seems to have been the only one of the last four presidents who stood the ordeal without physical impairment. One reason for this breakdown might be eliminated and that is the unreasonable and unjust criticism which is heaped upon a president by those who are opposed to him. More times than not this criticism is couched in the harshest terms, which could only be merited by criminal acts. To a man of sensitive temperament the experience is most trying and heart breaking. The Good Book's admonition is most apt: "Thou shalt not speak evil of the ruler of thy people." Presidents are men of like passions to ourselves, and we should do unto them as we would others should do unto us.—Eastern Clackamas News.

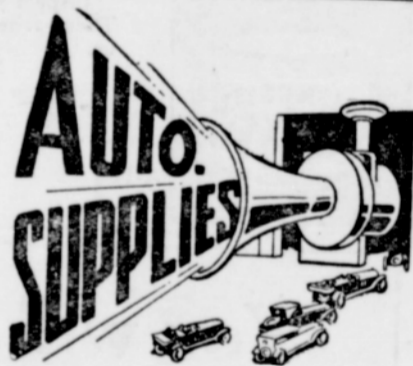
