FIFTY YEARS OF PROGRESS.

The Morning Astorian of August 28 is a fiftieth anniversary number. Its 58 pages are very attractive and contain many feature articles, well illustrated, showing Astoria's development, advantageous location and rapid recuperation from the disastrous fire of last December.

It is a little singular that the first settlement of Americans in the area later embraced in the state, was at Astoria. Early in the last century, more than a hundred years ago, Astoria was founded and became commercially important.

Fifty years is a long history for a newspaper in Oregon. The Oregonian was started as a weekly about 70 years ago. The Astorian started as a tri-weekly, July 1, 1873. It has been a daily for many years.
