

POWELL VALLEY MAN DIES AT HOSPITAL

Algot S. Anderson of Powell Valley died at Good Samaritan hospital on Tuesday, September 4, following an operation for appendicitis which he underwent a few days earlier. Mr. Anderson was born in Sweden January 8, 1887. He came to America when 19 years of age and about a year later came to Oregon and made his home in Powell Valley. There he married Miss Esther Stafanson on June 11, 1911. They lived here for a number of years and in Spokane for about five years, and came back to this locality a year ago.

Mr. Anderson leaves to mourn their loss his wife and one son, Lawrence, also his father and a brother in Sweden, two brothers, Axel and Frank in Virginia, Minnesota, Gust. in Canada and Victor in Colville, Washington.

Funeral services were held at Pearson's undertaking chapel in Portland on last Friday afternoon. Interment was in the Douglas cemetery. Many friends from Gresham and Portland were in attendance and others who were unable to attend the services in Portland assembled in the cemetery to show their sympathy for the bereaved family. The pallbearers were Wm. Peterson, August Frank, O. Thoren, B. Stevenson, Arvid Peterson and E. H. Stafanson.
