FIRE DAMAGES THE HERMAN WHILON HOME

The home of Herman Whilon, about a mile and a half southeast of Gresham, caught fire last Sunday soon after noon and considerable damage was done to the roof. An alarm was sounded in Gresham and many responded. These with neighbors helped to check the spread of the blaze and it was soon extinguished. The members of the Gresham volunteer department, though unable to take the chemical apparatus out, took hold in a systematic way and gave valuable assistance. Much of the household goods was removed. With a brisk east wind blowing it seemed uncertain for a time if the fire could be checked.

Mr. and Mrs. Whilon were away from home at the time but other members of the family were at the house, including the aged father A. C. Whilon. Some one driving along the road first saw the fire and stopped to inform the family.

The cause of the fire can only be guessed at but it probably started from a spark from the chimney lodging on the dry shingles. The loss is estimated at about \$400.

Mr. Whilon wishes through the Outlook to convey the sincere and hearty thanks of himself and family to the neighbors and friends and to the firemen and others from Gresham whose assistance saved his house from total destruction.

COW WINS MEDALS AND HIGH STANDING

"Blood will tell." In nothing does the old saying seem more true than in the high productive qualities transmitted in a line of careful breeding with Jerseys.

B. C. Altman has reason to be proud of the achievement of more than one of his Jerseys. One of the latest of his herd to win honors is Empress Lass of Ingleside. She qualified for gold and silver medals by producing 12,995 pounds of milk and 759.16 pounds of butterfat and qualifying for class AA. Lass' test is most creditable for she started at two and a half years of age, carried her calf 181 days during test and qualifies as the second highest senior two year old of the breed, being headed only by the great cow, St. Mawes Pretty Lady.

Lass was sired by St. Helier's Lad of Ingleside, a sire whose daughters' production promises to place him at the top. Her dam was Empress La-Belle, also dam of Empress Dorothy, who won gold and silver medals on her record of 736.56 pounds as a junior four-year old. Empress La-Belle herself has a record of 174.17 pounds of butterfat. She is by the same sire as St. Helier's Lad of Ingleside and both of them carry the blood of the famous bull, Imported Oxford You'll Do.
