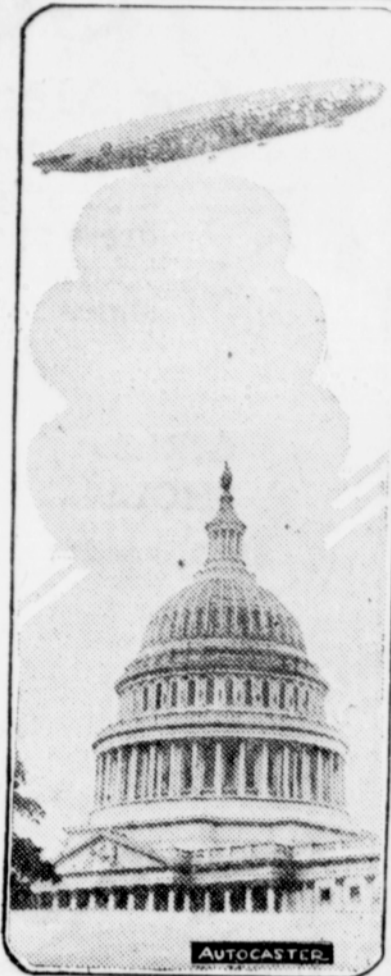
SANDY
