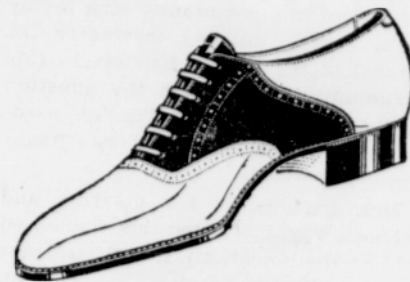

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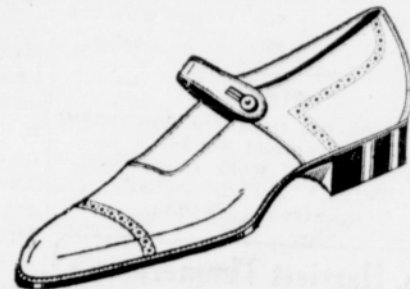

ELECTION NOTICE.

Public notice is hereby given that the general election for the City of Gresham, Oregon, will be held on Tuesday, November 6, 1923, in all regular voting precincts within said City of Gresham, between the hours of 8 o'clock a. m. and 8 o'clock p. m. of said day for the purpose of electing the following officers for the City of Gresham:

Three (3) councilmen to serve for a period of two (2) years each; also, the following proposed charter amendment, proposed by resolution of the City Council duly adopted the 9th day of October A. D. 1923:

Article 1, Section 12, Chapter V, to assess, levy and collect for general municipal purposes not to exceed three and one-third (3 1/3) mills on the dollar per annum for the years 1924, 1925 and 1926, in addition to the sums now provided by said Charter and in addition to the maximum amount to be otherwise allowed by the Tax Supervising and Conservation Commission of the County of Multnomah, State of Oregon.

City of Gresham, adopted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon and filed in the office of the Secretary of State on February 11, 1905, by amending Article 1, Section 12 of Chapter V to provide that the Council of the City of Gresham assess, levy and collect for general municipal purposes not to exceed three and one-third (3 1/3) mills on the dollar per annum for the years 1924, 1925 and 1926, in addition to the sums now provided by said Charter and in addition to the maximum amount to be otherwise allowed by the Tax Supervising and Conservation Commission of the County of Multnomah, State of Oregon.
