INCOME TAX ARGUMENT.

The Outlook believes there are some good reasons for favoring a state income tax but also believes many arguments being used are erroneous and misleading.

In the official argument for the bill, signed by Governor Pierce and others, it is stated that less than 4 per cent of the tax-paying ability of the state bears 80 per cent of the burden of local taxation.

The Oregon Voter analyzes this and other statements and finds them grossly erroneous. Referring to the year 1920, the year on which the former statement is based, the Voter finds that property within city limits levied on represented 54 per cent; non-farming property outside city limits, 22 per cent, and farming property, 24 per cent of the total.

Under sources of all taxes, including federal and local, sales taxes, excess profits and license fees, levied on, the Voter gives the following: property, income or business other than farming, 87 per cent; farm property, 13 per cent of the total.

Non-farming property represents 78 per cent of the income and farming property 22 per cent.

"All accurate figures," says the Voter, "if their meaning is set forth correctly, agree in supporting the conclusion that agriculture bears no more than its proportion of the combined tax burden and that the main burden is borne by the income, property and business of the cities."

"Yet," says the Voter, which is very thorough and accurate in its figures on taxation, "the people really suffer under the delusion that the use of real estate is responsible for less than 4 per cent of all the income of the people of the state, and that this 'less than 4 per cent' actually carries 80 per cent of the local tax burden of \$41,000,000. No wonder they desire to correct so flagrant a supposed injustice by voting an income tax to reach the 96 per cent of income that is supposed to come from use of undertaxed or untaxed property and not from use of overtaxed property yielding 4 per cent of the state's income."

The United States postoffice does not advertise anybody very often. The rules are very rigid. It is estimated that by show time 2,000,000 will have been sent forth bearing this legend.

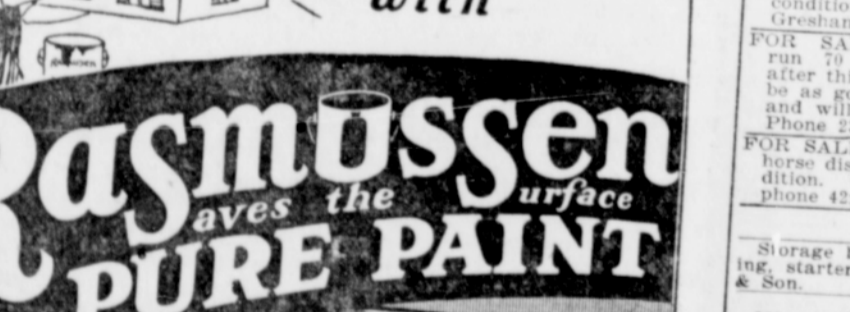
