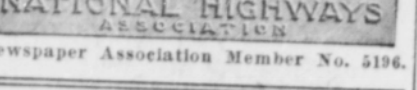

THE STATE INCOME TAX.

When a tax measure comes before the electorate calling for their consideration and vote it becomes apparent how little most people know on the subject, and of those who think they know how divergent are their opinions.

Those who are urging the state income tax set forth that it will lower taxes on property and that it will catch some investors and salaried people who pay little or no taxes at present.

Those who argue against the measure claim it will not lessen taxes, will be costly to enforce and will foster a new political machine.

Many persons seem to think that because the federal government as a war measure imposed an income tax the state can well do the same.

It must be remembered, however, that the federal income tax applies to all states alike while Oregon with an income tax law will stand alone among coast states, some of which have voted down a similar plan.

Those whom the law is intended especially to hit will find many ways to evade its requirements.

It presents itself as too much of an experiment to be safe at this stage of Oregon's development or lack of development.

C. C. Chapman, who might make a mistake but rarely does, says in the Oregon Voter that he knows of four instances in which "branch houses" have already reduced their business headquarters in Portland to mere "selling agencies" because of the prospect that this bill will become law by vote of the people, it having passed the legislature. They are already beyond the reach of the Oregon law although doing a nice business as interstate commerce.

The law now proposed, with its extraordinary peculiarities, imposes such conditions that it would take an optimistic outsider indeed to make a large investment in this state.

One feature, points out Mr. Chapman, the pending law requires the Canadian or Englishman—wherever he comes from—to file with Oregon a copy of his home office federal income tax return, thus peddling information as to his national and international volume of business and profit, is enough to make the outsider cautious. Petty annoyance in business matters often is more irritable than facing a large loss, and will operate along with the prospect of double taxation to keep the outsider from investing in this state.

Very few states have income tax laws and Wisconsin is said to be the only one that has the peculiar clause as to non-resident incomes. On account of it Wisconsin has been circumvented quite thoroughly by the large concerns moving their branch houses to other states.

The local industries will have to pay the income tax on top of a property tax except possibly for one year. We do not believe people or business concerns want to escape paying their just taxes. But they do object to being confronted now with a new, and what will doubtless prove in the end an additional tax, requiring new machinery, new expenses, new office holders, etc., to administer it.

BALLOT TITLE.

Charter Amendment submitted to the voters by the Council. An Act to amend the Charter of the City of Gresham, adopted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon and filed in the office of the Secretary of State on February 11, 1905, by amending Article 1, Section 12 of Chapter V to provide that the Council of the City of Gresham assess, levy and collect for general municipal purposes, not to exceed three and one-third (3-1/3) mills on the dollar per annum for the years 1924, 1925 and 1926, on all property, both real and personal, within the City, in addition to the sums now provided by said Charter, and in addition to the maximum amount to be otherwise allowed by the Tax Supervising and Conservation Commission of the County of Multnomah, State of Oregon.
