THE NEW INCOME TAX LAW, it is said, possesses many weak points and there is a strong probability that it will be tested as to its constitutionality.

According to the Oregon Voter there are five particular points about the law which justify the contention that the law is unconstitutional.

1. "The law includes dividends from national bank stock in the taxable income of residents of Oregon.

2. "The tax levied against incomes of non-residents is probably void because the method of assessing the same is unreasonable.

3. "The provision which taxes the income of corporation distributed as dividends to non-residents, whereas such income when distributed to residents of the state is exempt, is probably void under the Federal constitution.

4. "The plain meaning of the law appears to be that only those doing business in Oregon are taxed. If so, it is void for inequality.

5. "It is open to serious question whether the Constitution of Oregon permits a graduated tax."

SCHOOL NOTICE. Notice is hereby given to the legal voters of Union High School District No. 2, Multnomah county, state of Oregon, that an election will be held in said district at the High School building in Gresham, Oregon, on the 7th day of December, 1923, at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to vote on the question of increasing the amount of the Tax Levy in said district for the year 1923 by more than six per cent over the amount of such levy during the previous years since 1916.

It is necessary to raise this additional amount by special levy for the following reasons:

The Tax Supervising and Conservation Commission have determined that our present tax requirements calculated on the tax levy for 1916 are \$10,623.57 in excess of that allowed under the 6 per cent tax limitation:

Therefore, to provide sufficient funds to carry on the high school in its present high standard and to conduct same within the strict interpretation of the law it will be necessary that the taxpayers authorize a special tax of \$12,000.00 for the school year 1923-1924 to appear on the assessment roll of 1923 and to be collected in the year 1924, also a special tax of \$12,000.00 for the school year 1924-1925 to appear on the assessment roll for 1924 and to be collected in the year 1925, also a special tax of \$12,000.00 for the school year 1925-1926 to appear on the assessment roll for 1925 and to be collected in the year 1926.

The voting of this special tax does not increase the total amount to be raised as adopted by the budget committee but complies with the requirements of the Tax Supervising and Conservation Commission.

Last year the total tax was \$27,169.46, the budget for this year calls for \$27,760.50, an increase of \$600.00, but under the ruling of the Tax Commission our correct limit is placed at \$13,949.43 and the balance, except that required for bonded indebtedness, must be voted by the legal voters of the district.
