

POTATO GRADING MEET BROUGHT MANY FARMERS

Fully 150 potato growers from eastern Multnomah and northern Clackamas met at the grange hall on Tuesday afternoon to discuss the new potato grading law and witness a demonstration of actual grading. As a result much misunderstanding was cleared up and a feeling of confidence in the law and in its good effects seemed to be established.

It had been reported that unprincipled buyers had bought up quantities of potatoes, many of them graded too low, giving them the opportunity of regrading and selling them at a large profit. It was said that these buyers told of many arrests of growers for improper grading. As a result there had arisen a feeling of apprehension and of opposition to the law.

Federal Market Inspector Ringer, who was the main speaker, said that no arrests have been made under the law. He gave the minimum size of U. S. No. 1 as one and one-third inches across the potato, whereas some have been throwing out of that grade all which did not reach four inches in diameter. Potatoes of this grade, however, must be sound and free from any injury.

Ten or twelve different lots of potatoes were brought for demonstration and an opportunity was given everyone to learn at first hand how to grade them.
