A SAD INCIDENT.

The county judge of Wheeler county is doubtless a sad man because of his moral lapse; the justice of the peace who was obliged to sentence him for driving an automobile while intoxicated and having liquor in his possession, was saddened on account of the necessity of sentencing his friend to jail and a fine; the family and friends of the county judge are sad because of the affair. It should be a lesson to all who read.

The newspaper report says that Justice Allen, who had known the defendant from boyhood scored Judge Keys for his action. In imposing sentence he said:

"If your father were here today he would say: 'Allen, do your duty,' and I'm going to do it. I would rather go down here on the street and take a good licking than to do what my duty tells me to, but I'm going to do it."

"A man who will go out there on the highway, drunk and driving an automobile, where others have met death and terrible injuries as the result of careless driving, hasn't any more business to do than a man has to go down the street with a high-powered rifle and begin shooting."

"Henry, the judgment of this court is that you pay a fine of \$250 and be sentenced to jail for 20 days. One week from today you will return to Wasco county and serve out your time."

"When that is done I want you to go back to Wheeler county, where you have the confidence of the people who gave you the highest office in their power, and serve them faithfully."

CITY VERSUS COUNTRY?

Referring to the filing with the secretary of state of an initiative bill to repeal the recently passed state income tax law by C. C. Chapman, of The Oregon Voter, the Grange Bulletin says:

"The attitude of a comparatively few men in Portland is rapidly driving the farmers of Oregon into the ranks of the Non-Partisan League, which is far from being a dead issue in our state. Portland is arraying the county against the cities."

"That is rather an ugly charge. We do not believe it is true and we believe Brother Chapman is sincere in his opposition to the new law, and that he has in mind as much the farmer's good as that of the city dweller."

Mr. Chapman, through his Magazine, was one of the strongest opponents of the income tax law. He presented in issue after issue carefully compiled figures to show that the arguments used in favor of the new law from the farmers' standpoint were fallacious.

It must be admitted the voters of the state were badly divided on the subject. It found much opposition among the farmers and much support among voters of the cities. The most that can be said is that the vote of the larger cities showed a tendency to oppose the law, while the country vote showed a tendency to favor it.

The farmer grasped at the law because he thought it would lighten his burden. Whether it will remain to be seen, but it is doubtful. The state has simply voted a new tax, requiring a new and large administrative force, with effort on the part of some to evade the tax and an additional chance to play politics.

Commercial Club Adopts New By-Laws

made by lot under the direction of the committee in charge of the election. Section 6. The president shall select a committee of not less than three election tellers who shall count the ballots, at which time any member of the Commercial club may be present and the election tellers shall thereafter certify the standing of all candidates upon the completion of the count.

Section 7. Vacancies in the board of directors shall be filled by the remaining directors and the secretary. Vacancies shall be filled in this manner for the unexpired term of the director whose leaving the board brought about.

Article VI. Officers.

Section 1. Within ten days after the annual election, the directors shall meet and elect officers for the ensuing year; a president, one vice president and a treasurer. Subsequently the board shall employ a manager, who shall be secretary, and whose compensation shall be determined by the board. All the officers must be members of the board, except the secretary.

Section 2. The secretary and treasurer shall each furnish surety or personal bonds in such amounts as the board of directors shall deem necessary, the cost to be paid by the Gresham Commercial club.

Section 3. The duties of the officers shall be such as their titles by general usage would indicate, and such as required by law, and such as may be assigned to them respectively by the board of directors from time to time.

Article VII. Committees.

Section 1. Committee appointments shall be for a period not exceeding the term of the appointing president. The board may also appropriate money from the general fund, or authorize the expenditure of funds for committee purposes.

Section 2. Committees shall be empowered to make investigations, conduct hearings, and within the limits of their appropriation, employ such counsel, technical or clerical assistance as they may deem necessary to accomplish their purpose, all of which shall be subject to the approval of the board of directors.

Section 3. All committee reports shall be made by the committee chairman and presented to the president and no part of such report shall be disclosed to the press or public except on authority of the board of directors.

Section 4. Committees shall be discharged by the directors when their reports have been accepted or when in the opinion of the board, it is deemed wise to discontinue activities on which any committee may be engaged.

Article VIII. Meetings.

Section 1. The annual meeting of the Gresham Commercial club shall be on the fourth Monday of January of each year. The place and hour shall be designated by the board of directors, five days notice being given the members.

Section 2. Meetings of the membership shall be held at such other times as the president and board of directors may determine, or upon written request of ten or more members in good standing; provided that when called called meetings shall contain a statement of the purpose, and it shall be mailed to the members at least three days preceding the meeting.

Section 3. At all meetings, 33 per cent of the members in good standing shall constitute a quorum.

Section 4. The board of directors shall meet at regular periods. Absence from three consecutive meetings without excuse deemed valid by a majority of the board, and so recorded by the board of directors, shall automatically operate as a resignation.

Section 5. A special meeting of the board of directors may be called at any time by the president or by three directors, providing that a call shall be issued to each director, stating the purpose of the meeting, not less than three hours preceding the meeting.

Section 6. At all meetings of the board of directors, a majority shall constitute a quorum.

Section 7. At committee meetings a majority shall constitute a quorum, except that when a committee consists of more than five members three shall constitute a quorum.

Section 8. Deliberations of this organization both when meeting as a body and during the meeting of the board of directors shall be governed by Roberts' Rules of Order.

Article IX. Fiscal Year.

Section 1. The fiscal year of the Gresham Commercial club shall end on the 4th Monday of January of each year.

Article X. Amendments.

These by-laws may be revised or amended by a two-thirds vote of the members present at any regular meeting of the membership or at any special meeting called for that purpose, provided notice of such intention is given at least ten days prior to such special meeting.
