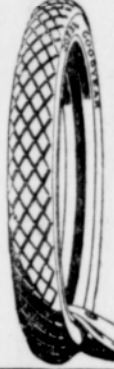

LAST RITES HELD FOR OLD-TIME RESIDENT

Funeral services were held at Finley's chapel in Portland on Saturday for Mrs. Anna C. Crane, Oregon pioneer, who died at the home of her son, Fred Crane, near Fairview on November 29. Mrs. Crane was a daughter of the late Captain William E. Moltthrop and a great-granddaughter of Colonel Miles, chief of staff under Washington in the Revolutionary war. She was born in New Haven, Connecticut, April 6, 1840. She came to Oregon in her girlhood by way of the Isthmus of Panama. She married a well known San Francisco dentist in 1853, who died in 1868. She is survived by her sons Fred Crane of Fairview and George Crane of Portland, by a grandson, George M. Crane of Fairview and a great-granddaughter, Genevieve Crane.

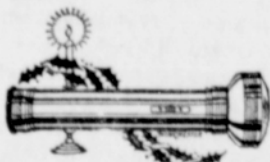
